Climate Emergency

- In 2019, Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council declared a climate emergency at full council
- Committed to make the council's own buildings and operations carbon neutral by 2025
- Pledged to work towards net zero carbon for the Borough by 2030.
- A revised Climate Change and Air Quality strategy is being produced to go to committee in September and consultation in the autumn



Why we want to engage with Parish & Town Councils

- Local knowledge each area knows what their individual problems/barriers are
- We recognise you have local knowledge and enthusiasm for change in your communities
- Each area is different
- Before lockdown a number of towns and parishes had contacted us wanting to carry out climate emergency actions in their areas
- Despite the current situation, planning can take place now and some actions progressed
- BDBC can offer support in all of this from help to plan actions and delivering them
- Links to other projects such as Neighbourhood Plans or local biodiversity projects



What schemes are currently available for communities?

- **GREENING CAMPAIGN** community engagement tool. Getting your residents working together to make carbon reduction changes in their lives.
- OVERTON CASE STUDY Parish Council has declared their own climate emergency and established groups to focus on sector. Currently working on a Whole Village Energy Plan

• ANNUAL GREEN WEEK

- a borough wide programme of events/activities providing Information on how to live more sustainably and have fun
- Now 8th year; smaller programme of events this year but to include local directory of environmentally friendly shops/services
